The Program

Our Boards and Commissions Fellowship develops the skills and capacity of North Carolina leaders and builds the power of underrepresented groups to serve on boards and commissions. Underrepresented communities are impacted most by voter suppression efforts, economic injustice, and environmental exploitation. Being at the frontlines of these issues makes leaders from these communities uniquely equipped to make meaningful, long-term changes that benefit all of North Carolina.

Our program consists of a 6-month, virtual training class in which fellows attend monthly sessions that allow them to explore their political interests, network with influential community members, undergo a mentorship with community leaders, build their resume, and eventually serve on a local board or commission.

This program is primarily virtual. We welcome fellows from across the state.

Increase Representation

Our program is designed to increase local governments' representative diversity by recruiting women, people of color, people who identify as LGBTQIA+, and other underrepresented groups to serve on local appointed boards and commissions.



Develop Civic Leadership Skills

The program helps our fellows develop civic leadership skills by holding monthly trainings, pairing fellows with mentors for one-on-one coaching, and providing hands-on experience with parliamentary procedure, decision-making processes, and more.



Provide Policy Training

While applicants are not required to have previous conservation policy experience, our fellows will gain critical knowledge during the program, in order to give them the tools they need to successfully advance conservation policy while serving on a local board or commission.
